This letter is being written at the start of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. This is usually observed towards the beginning of the year and encourages churches of all denominations and traditions to pray for one another and for God's love to be



seen and shown through our lives together.

This year's theme is 'Go and Do Likewise' reflecting the words that Jesus spoke to the teacher of the law having shared the parable of the Good Samaritan. The parable of the Good Samaritan is one of the best known passages of Scripture, yet one that never seems to lose its power to challenge indifference to suffering and to inspire solidarity. It is a story about crossing boundaries that calls our attention to the bonds that unite the whole human family.

Have you ever had said to you 'Do as I say not as I do'? Jesus in response to a question that was trying to trip Him up says, in effect, 'Do as I say as well as what I do'.

We are surrounded by people who need help in many different ways. We too at times, need people to come alongside to help us. We need each other. That's a basic human condition - the need for one another. Often that's quite tough - we don't want our offer to be rejected so we'd rather not step up and step out or we would rather people think we're doing OK instead of reaching out and asking.

The story of the Good Samaritan shows that sometimes we can be the samaritan helping out and sometimes we are the person in need.

Whichever one you are today may you know the strength of God to help you in all you do.

As a start there was a ceremonial Washing of Hands.



THE INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE GUIDE

The Methodist Church has published an *Inclusive Language Guide*. This helps the Church hold conversations without making assumptions or inadvertently causing upset.

The Assistant Secretary of the Methodist Conference, the Rev Michaela Youngson, explains why words are important and how the guide affirms traditional terms such as husband and wife while allowing people to express themselves using the language that is right for them.

Words in general are powerful and important and, of course, human language is changing all the time. The Methodist Church, as part of our calling to be an inclusive Church, is paying attention to the language that we use and is encouraging everyone to be careful in

the words used when we are talking with and about people. We should never use offensive, racist, sexist or homophobic language but also part of loving our neighbour is to consider how they might want to be addressed or described.

Those in the life of the Church who help prepare people for special events such as baptisms, funerals and marriages will want to use language that is inclusive and reflects for those involved the language that they would choose to use for themselves. So, as well as traditional language such as 'husband and wife' it might be appropriate to use words such as 'partner' or 'spouse'. This is not a discarding of particular terms but an opening up of our language in a way that reflects the gracious and inclusive nature of God's love.

As the world's understanding of each person's identity changes, the Church is learning more about what it means to be created in God's image — our language about God is limited by our human understanding — as that understanding grows, so does our knowledge of the God who created us. In our guide to inclusive language we offer practical advice about how our language might be used in ways that do not exclude people, whatever their identity. We are called to love in the way that Christ loves, recognising, as St Paul's Letter to the Galatians, that in Christ Jesus we are all children of God in faith.

THE BRISTOL METHODIST CENTRE

In 2015 the service moved from Midland Road to the current location at Lincoln Street in Lawrence Hill.

Since then we have aimed to fulfil the traditions of the



original Methodist project and have expanded the means of assistance to the homeless and vulnerable, which include more modern approaches such as online access and training for those in need.

The new bigger building has meant that partnership working with other agencies has been much more efficient and we are able to deal with the growing demands on our service.

The Methodist Centre has become a necessary hub for organisations to centralise their operations and work closely with us in assisting those individuals with complex needs. In this way of working together with other service providers, we have helped a great many people achieve successful outcomes across a variety of complex issues, helping them on their journey of change and breaking the cycle of homelessness.

We are dedicated to offering shelter, sanctuary and support to the homeless, vulnerable and excluded by offering a safe, peaceful and welcoming environment . That is open to all with staff that are able to come alongside our guests at their varying points of crisis and will journey with them, as we seek to first address their short term needs and then help them make changes or arrange support for them to achieve their long term needs.

People of all or no faith are welcome at the centre but they must respect our ethos and values.

Our Christian beliefs underpin all of the valued work we offer at the Methodist Centre. Prayer is always available to our guests if they request this, and there is a weekly worship service on a Wednesday morning that is open for anyone to attend if they are so inclined to do so.

LOCAL GANGS TAKE OVER METHODIST CHURCHES IN HAITI

Mission Coordinator for the Methodist Haiti District, David Draeger, gives us an update on the situation in Haiti and how it affects daily life.



It is hard to believe that another year has come and gone. Most days are like the one precedes and the one follows. that The unendina arief from continuous gang warfare, murder, with rape, extortion, and robbery tends to lull us into complacent oblivion. It is

sad to say that I do not get as much accomplished as I would wish because hope for the future dwindles. It seems easier to just go with the flow and do nothing rather than to try and change the unchangeable.

When I stop for a moment and look around, I see evidence that the Church, specifically Eglise Méthodiste d' Haiti [The Methodist Church in Haiti] is moving forward. There are some church buildings, like St. Martin and Croix d' Boquets, that have been taken over by the local gangs so that the people are unable to worship in their own sanctuary. Other congregations are unable to travel through ganginfested areas to their normal places of worship. At the same time, I see congregations like Frères and Jérémie that are relatively safe, and their worship services are full every Sunday. Throughout the whole country there is the same pattern; some churches are hampered by the gangs and others remain as a light in a darkened world.

But then I am awakened by the Hope proclaimed by Jesus Christ and my faith in the future is renewed. Throughout the year there are births and deaths, weddings and funerals, there are still confirmation classes and Bible studies where people are coming to Christ and as a result are professing their membership in the Methodist Church of Haiti."

Please keep supporting the World Mission Fund that serves partners with solidarity grants. These grants are given to a partner who is facing particularly difficult circumstances or an emergency situation. Although the grants may seem quite small in the global scale of things, they are a rapid response that express solidarity in partnership and can often open the door for our partners to receive other funding from around the world.

In 2023, your donations to the World Mission Fund enabled the Methodist Church in Haiti to support hundreds of people in their communities affected by the prolonged political and social crisis. With these funds, the church set up mobile clinics to tackle the outbreak of cholera and other health problems, as well as distribute dried food packages to support community health promotion.

She acted as key holder for anyone needing access to the Wesley Centre. These are just a few of the things she did and all done quietly in the power and love of God. I last saw Mary when I delivered her November copy of Together, although she could no longer attend church services she was still extremely interested in all the news, facts and figures and I had to make sure I had the correct answers to her very many

questions. On the 8th January we gathered to say goodbye to our dear friend—--leaving sadness on earth but I'm sure rejoicing in heaven. Mary, an inspiration to us all.
