STATEMENT IN RESPONSE TO THE PRIME MINISTER'S ANNOUNCEMENT ON NET ZERO POLICIES

A joint statement by The Baptist Union of Great Britain, The Methodist Church, The United Reformed Church

We are dismayed that the Prime Minister is delaying the implementation of policies to achieve net zero. As Christian leaders we are deeply committed to encouraging all within our sphere of

influence to be ambitious in reaching net zero as we seek to care for God's creation. This transition must be rapid, equitable and just.

At a time when so many people are struggling financially, the government has a crucial role to play in ensuring the cost of transition to net zero does not fall most heavily on those least able to afford it. Delaying measures to insulate homes will have the opposite effect, and slowing efforts to reduce fossil fuel use will increase climate impacts on vulnerable communities around the globe.

Extreme weather events this year have demonstrated the urgency of the situation. The independent Climate Change Committee have assessed that even current policy measures are insufficient to meet the UK's climate targets. The government needs to urgently demonstrate how it will get the UK back on track to reach net zero before 2050.

The commitments made at COP26 were instrumental in providing confidence to industry, investors and civil society that the UK was serious about rising to the climate challenge. It is a source of extreme disappointment that the Prime Minister's announcement will damage that confidence and undermine our collective efforts. As a country, we have moral and legal responsibilities to show leadership in tackling the climate emergency together.

PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT UPDATE ON THE SITUATION IN THE MIDDLE EAST

As deaths and injuries of civilians continue to rise in the Israel-Hamas conflict, we are heartbroken to see the devastation this is having on so many people living in the region. We believe in a God who weeps, and, alongside the Holy Spirit our Comforter, our hearts

are breaking with all those whose loved ones have had their lives brutally cut short, for the terror felt by Israeli families, and the unimaginable wait that many face for news of the people being held hostage. We watch in horror as Gazan civilians flee for their lives, unable to leave Gaza and trapped in the midst of a violent and unpredictable conflict.

The situation may feel overwhelming; so much information, so much misinformation and so much misery. Where is our hope? Watching and reading news reports can leave us confused and feeling helpless. What can we do? As members of the Methodist Church we have witnessed the plight of the Palestinian people's oppression for many years and have sought to encourage those on all sides who are working for lasting peace with justice in the region.

Now we pray for all those people and groups we have met: Daoud Nasser from the Tent of Nations and the recipient of the World Methodist Peace Prize in 2018; Rabbi Nava Hefetz from Rabbis for Human Rights, the Wi'am Peace and Reconciliation Centre in Bethlehem; the staff of the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme for Palestine and Israel, and the countless people and families in Gaza and the West Bank who we, as a Church, have supported over the years. We uphold them, praying for their safety, asking for God's And we pray for those who have the protection and comfort. power to effect change - that they will use this privilege wisely and well to put a swift end to this violence and aggression. We undertake to continue to pray that the beautiful peace of the Prince of Peace will manifest in our world, and we pledge ourselves once again to respond to the Gospel of God's love in Christ and to live out this discipleship in our worship and mission.

We call on the UK Government to do all it can to encourage dialogue between Israel, the Palestinian Authority, Egypt and states in the wider region. We urge our Government to use its influence to end the siege of Gaza that is depriving its population of water and food, and to call on all parties to abide by international humanitarian law.

As well as praying, we ask you to consider doing the following:

- •Supporting Christian Aid's appeal and/or signing a petition calling on the UK Government to establish safe routes out of Gaza for people left homeless or caught up in the violence
- •Find out more about the situation
- •Write to your MP to ask them to act to protect civilians in Gaza and to support a lasting peace
- •Be generous to those who you may not agree with, and try to find common ground. Pray for those people and, if appropriate, pray together. Be aware of those in your church or community who are particularly impacted by this situation, whether they have a connection with Israel or Palestine or because this is a painful and traumatic reminder of their own experiences of conflict. And please pray for those in leadership who are being called to offer support to the people who are impacted by the ongoing situation.

3GENERATE 2023 Almost 1,300 young people aged 4-23 years old, 400 adults accompanied who 220 wonderful and volunteers, all from across Connexion, the toaether in celebration. worship and fellowship at this year's 3Generate, the Methodist Children Youth Assembly. with a record attendance that was a 25 percent increase over last year. 3Generate

is a unique space for children and young people to develop their faith and to have their voices heard for what they want the Church and society to be like. At 3Generate young people are invited to listen to God, each other and the world, while being supported to discern what they hear. They are encouraged to take action, both at the event and when they return home, on their own, with their peers and with the help of adults.

3Generate is on an impressive scale, filling four of the giant halls at the NEC with activities, performances, worship and on-site accommodation with over 900 tents pitched inside the venue for the young people and their leaders.

Suzanne Butler, a contributor to the event with Fischy Music, said of her experience at 3Generate, "We really enjoyed being part of it, and are keen to keep up the connection. What a feat of organisation, with so much creativity, inclusion and spiritual thoughtfulness in evidence."

Our Minister who attended with a group from Portishead Methodist Church said, "I think it's just amazing. It has given our young people a sense of being part of something bigger. They come and they think, wow, there's 1300 young Methodists here, and that gives their confidence as Christians such a boost."

The Methodist Youth President, Tom Hart, commented, "3Generate feels really special, you can see the way that the young people are interacting with the activities and each other, growing in fellowship."

"The event has developed year upon year as 3Generate has been refined blending faith and fun, exploring new ways of worship. The "Picnic in the park" worship was based on feeding the 5000, there was the Metal Methodist whose worship rocked and Lego Church, which was especially popular with the 4 to 7 year olds."

Jude Levermore, Head of Mission, said, "3Generate is so important to the life of the Church.

"The young people learn from each other and from the carefully curated content of the event, but importantly the Church learns from them. You could sense God's spirit moving throughout the weekend, in the conversations that people had, in the worship and in the fun that you saw expressed on everyone's faces."

LET'S END POVERTY LAUNCH

Let's End Poverty was launched on 14th October 2023

The launch occurred simultaneously across several cities in person, as well as online. People came together for the day, to advocate for the end of poverty and to fight those established systems that perpetuate it.

Recent events such as the war in Ukraine have increased the cost of living, this has led to a rise in the number of people experiencing poverty and the deepening of its impact. As of March 2023, The Trussel Trust announced that during the previous 12 months they had given out a record number of food parcels, with almost 3 million (2,986,203) given to needy families and individuals.

"Not doing anything is a moral failing," says Hannah Fremont-Brown, the Anti-Poverty Movement Methodist Coordinator.

"In between the increasingly desperate financial situation for many and the looming general election, now is the time to get organised and tackle the poverty issue, given the seeming ambivalence of our politicians."

Gill Newton, President of the Methodist Conference, said, "Currently poverty is impacting on far too many lives across our nation, and engaging with the Let's End Poverty movement now is one way that the Methodist people can play their part in the transformation of the world."

Hosted online by Hannah Fremont-Brown and Ali McMillian, a Deacon at Central Hall Westminster, the launch of the Let's End Poverty Movement was a chance to brainstorm and consolidate ideas.

People who joined the London gathering at Wesley's Chapel all have experience of poverty, either personally or through others, and are joined together by their desire, in Hannah's words, "to make ending poverty a political priority by showing that ending poverty matters for our communities."

The launch featured recordings that presented the Let's End Poverty project and offered moments for the attendees to reflect, give their opinions and share their ideas about the way ahead. "We

have the technology, the infrastructure and the funds to end poverty, what we lack is political will," asserted one of those who was interviewed. One of those attending the launch in London added, "We are committed to ending poverty because we cannot trust our political leaders to do it."

The aim is to bring together a collective representing a wide range of people with varied backgrounds, skills and experiences. The Let's End Poverty Movement is ecumenical and always keen for those who want to fight against poverty to join. There is power in numbers and, with the Methodist Church in Britain having already signed up, other churches and institutions are invited to join too.

Kerry Scarlett, Vice-President of the Methodist Conference, concluded. "We know the lasting, negative impact that poverty has on our lives. But we also know that poverty is not inevitable. As a justice-seeking church, we believe that God consistently shows a bias of care and concern for people experiencing poverty and economic marginalisation and that we, as Methodists, are called to stand in solidarity with one another, seeking justice and transformation. I urge all Methodists to engage with the Let's End Poverty movement, to call upon those in power to make the changes that will enable others to flourish."
